A list of useful emacs key commands

For those who do like emacs, here are some useful key-commands, where C-key stands for Ctrl+key, i.e. hold the Ctrl key down and press key. Similarly, M-key means hold the Meta (or Alt) key down and press key.

Emacs, like many other text editors, keeps track of your editing in a buffer. It only writes the contents of a buffer to disk if told to do so! It can deal with many buffers simultaneously (see below). It asks for and gives information at the very bottom. If you want to abort such a dialog type C-].
